Key message we are assessing the evidence of only what has been taught in 2021 not projecting from this as in 2020.

- 1. Selection of evidence to cover as many Assessment Objectives (AO) as possible (from whatever the source).
- 2. Use the widest range of evidence we can. We can select best evidence for cohort but must not do this for individual students.
- 3. Appeals: Evidence must match the centre policy requirements. To prevent bias, we have completed blind marking internally or are moderating with other local schools
- 4. Students cannot appeal based on a submitted piece not being used as evidence if another source for that AO has been chosen (which is reasonable/justifiable) for the cohort.



- 5. Teachers must share sources of evidence used by subjects before June 18. This enables students to question/appeal any decisions relating to evidence base.
- 6. Students disengaged but (completing assessments now) do not get dispensation for this.
- 7. NEA work must be included as evidence if completed or incomplete. If incomplete use evidence of where grade is at with professional judgement.
- 8.SEND: Normal procedures should be followed (eg) 25% extra time, reader, typing etc. For work completed before this decision, this <u>must</u> be considered (were they disadvantaged by not having that) on any chosen evidence?



- 9. Teachers must not share final GCSE or A Level grades. All grades should be linked to formative assessment how you can improve.
- 10. Parents or students requesting higher grades could be classed as malpractice.
- 11. Cannot discuss University places based on teacher assessed grades
- 12. Any evidence used from 24 March 2021 must be stored; a markbook is not acceptable after this date.





All students have signed a Student declaration form confirming:

1. Teachers are only assessing students on what that they have been taught

2. they understand the 2021 exam procedures

3. they know what assessment evidence is being used

4. they know to contact Mr Pallant if they have any concerns or questions.

Who can request a review and when?

Any student, may submit a request for a centre review on the grounds that the centre has:

- failed to follow its procedures properly or consistently in arriving at that result or
- made an administrative error in relation to the result.

Requests for appeals on the grounds of academic judgement (unreasonableness) will only be considered by awarding organisations (at Stage Two) and not by centres. In these cases, an initial centre review must still be completed to ensure that the centre has not made any procedural or administrative errors. The centre should not review its academic judgements during the centre review stage.

To decide whether to request a review, students will need access to certain information before results day, or on results day, if it has not already been made available to them. This must include:

- a. the centre policy
- b. the sources of evidence used to determine the student's grade, along with the marks/grades associated with them
- c. details of any variations in evidence used based on disruption to what that student was taught
- d. details of any special circumstances that have been considered in determining their grade, e.g. access arrangements/reasonable adjustments or mitigating circumstances such as illness.
