



## Pupil Premium 2017-2018

The Pupil Premium is additional funding to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers. The Service Pupil premium is also received which is designed to assist the School to provide mainly non-educational support (ie pastoral care) for the children of service personnel. Catch up Premium funding is also received for those in Year 7 who did not reach the national standard in literacy or numeracy.

The strategy is monitored by the Governing Body, with a nominated governor for Pupil premium, and will be reviewed by the Academic Leadership group and the Senior Leadership team in the first half of the Summer Term 2017.

### Pupil Premium

#### Barriers to achievement

Literacy and numeracy skills are lower for students eligible for the Pupil Premium than for others. The level of motivation of some Pupil Premium students, and their engagement with the ethos of the School both within and without the classroom can be lower than for others. Disciplinary standards, particularly in a whole day boarding environment, can also affect educational attainment.

#### Pupil Premium Strategy

An extra teacher in both English and Maths: A proportion of the salary of a new English and mathematics teacher to enable smaller class sizes in the core subjects.

## Service Pupil Premium

### Barriers to achievement

Many of the students in receipt of the Service Premium have had a fractured education, attending more schools than would normally be expected for someone of their age. They can have problems relating to the formation and maintenance of friendships as well as separation problems in relation to their families. These problems can be exacerbated when parents are on active service.

## Service Premium Strategy

### Counselling £15000

The School provides professional counselling to students where necessary. Two counsellors are employed so as to provide a range of support to students. Students have welcomed the support offered by the counsellors and the service has been extended to provide group sessions in addition to one to one counselling so as to meet the needs of the students.

### Prep and House support £4000

Additional staffing in prep and in junior Houses is provided by graduate tutors, to help to guide and support students as they complete work and whilst relaxing. The additional help provided by the graduate tutors allows for greater adult presence and the provision of more activities for the youngest students. A proportion of their salaries is funded by the Pupil Premium.

### Laptops £8000

The School provides laptops to all students which can be used both within and without lessons. The laptops help to facilitate contact with family and friends away from School through e-mail and social media links, strengthening ties and providing other links for pastoral support. A proportion of the funding for the laptops comes from the Service Pupil Premium Funding.

### Pastoral Leaders £10000

Pastoral leaders provide additional support in Houses and have had their roles refocused so as to provide additional time directed towards students and greater adult presence and support. Contact hours with students have been extended in Senior Houses and some of the funding for this has come from the Service Pupil Premium.

### Library £5000

A proportion of the Library budget comes from the Service Pupil Premium and is used to fund the extended range of books and journals that are available to students.

Bursaries £13000

The School provides a number of bursaries to students in receipt of the Service Pupil Premium to allow for continuity of education and ongoing pastoral support, particularly for those who have recently left the forces.

### **Catch up Premium**

£4500 in catch up funding was received for the financial year 2016-2017, with £2500 having been received the previous year. The main spending in both years has been on Accelerated Reader which provides a tool for monitoring and promoting independent reading with reporting and diagnostic elements. The programme has had a clear impact on the literacy standards of those following the scheme.

### **Measuring Impact**

The impact of Pupil Premium and Catch Up Funding will be monitored through the year by data analysis of the target groups through 4Matrix, discussed at Academic Leadership Group meetings. For those in Year 11, the main measurement will be through analysis of GCSE examination results in August 2017. The performance of the students will be measured in comparison to the rest of the year group, national standards and performance of students in previous academic years.
